#### III. CHALLENGES AS A YOUNG MAN

- 1. He was reluctant to accept responsibility (perhaps age 20).
- 2. Israel's Apostasy was at an all-time high likened to an espoused wife who had forsaken her husband for promiscuous association with men, making herself a common profligate.
- 3. Judah being worse as described in Chapter 2 Israel had split off 300 years before from Judah and some 100 years before had been carried away captive by the Assyrians and Judah, being blind to the significance of Israel's fall, did not repent and under the wicked reign of Manasseh had sunk lower and lower into depravity.
- 4. Manasseh's reign was for 55 years, King of Judah (697 642 B.C.); and it was during this time Jeremiah was born. The next King was Amon (641 640 B.C.) reigning for 2 years, the son of Manasseh. Then Josiah came on the scene as King of Judah from (639 608 B.C.) 31 years as a good king. It was the 13<sup>th</sup> year of Josiah's reign that Jeremiah began his ministry. There seemed to be a reformation but in reality it was only outward because at heart the people were still idolaters. Other contemporary kings followed:
  - > Jehoahaz (608 B.C.) 3 months
  - ➤ Jehoiakim (608 597 B.C.) 11 years
  - A man defiant of God, openly for Idols and a bitter enemy of Jeremiah.
  - ➤ Jehoiachin (597 B.C.) 3 months Was carried to Babylon.
  - > Zedekiah (597 586 B.C.) 11 years He was a weak king, but rather friendly to Jeremiah.

#### IV. CHRONOLOGY IN JEREMIAH'S TIME

- 1. 627 B.C. Reformation time under King Josiah See II Chronicles 34.
- 2. 626 B.C. God's call to Jeremiah
- 3. 626 B.C. Scythian Invasion (Chapter 4) Swarms of Barbarians from the North struck terror to the nations of Southwest Asia, a terrific blow to the tottering Assyrian power.
- 4. 621 B.C. Book found Josiah's Great Reformation (II Kings 22, 23)
- 5. 608 B.C. Josiah slain at Megiddo, by Pharaoh.
- 6. 607 B.C. Nineveh destroyed by Babylon (some say 612 B.C.?)
- 7. 606 B.C. Judah subdued by Babylon. First Captivity.
- 8. 605 B.C. Babylon crushed Egypt. Battle of Carchemish.
- 9. 597 B.C. Jehoiachin's Captivity.
- 10. 593 B.C. Zedekiah's Visit to Babylon.
- 11. 586 B.C. Jerusalem Burned. Temporary End of David's Kingdom.
- 12. Notice above that Jeremiah was called to the prophetic office in 626 B.C. and Jerusalem was partly destroyed in 606 B.C with further devastation in 597 and finally burned and desolated in 586. Jeremiah lived through 40 terrible years, a pathetic and lonely figure. A weeping prophet in the midst of people who would not repent, hopelessly and fanatically attached to Idols (Note here some points from the <u>Doctrine of Idolatry</u>).

### V. JEREMIAH – A BROKEN HEARTED MAN WITH A MESSAGE OF REPENTANCE
