<u>Thanksgiving – A Grateful Heart</u>

- I. Thanksgiving means to gratefully acknowledge benefits and favors especially if we are using the word with relationship to our Heavenly Father. There are a number of Scripture passages dealing with this subject: Col.4:2; I Tim.4:3, 4; 2 Cor. 9:15; Rev. 7:12; Lev. 7:12-15; Psa.50:14; Psa. 95:2; Psa. 100:3-5; and Psa. 147:7
- II. Thanksgiving is not a once a year occasion. Thanksgiving should be a daily experience; it is the daily expression of our gratitude to God. It is not physical food, but spiritual food that every Christian needs. Therefore, when a person has grown in grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ he will have a capacity for gratitude. A person who knows God's love, mercy, grace, and compassion will have an overflowing attitude of gratitude (I Chron. 16:7-36).
- III. Thanksgiving, then, should be a normal daily activity for the born-again believer. Eph. 5:20 "Be always thankful for all things in the sphere of our Lord Jesus Christ, even to the Father." I Thess. 5:18 "In everything give thanks, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus."
- IV. For a Christian to be truly thankful, he must not only know Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, but have an expanding knowledge of God's Word the Bible (Psa. 100:3-5).
- V. In both the Old and New Testaments there is an emphasis upon the sacrifice of thanksgiving. This worship depends upon a relationship with God in knowledge. Amos 4:5 "Offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving with leaven." Psa. 116:17 "I will offer to Thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving." Psa.107:22 "Let them also offer the sacrifices of thanksgiving and tell of His words with happy singing."

<u>Thanksgiving – A Grateful Heart</u> (Continued)

Thanksgiving is dependent upon the stability of the Believer. Col. 3:15 – "and let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to which indeed ye are called in one body; and be thankful." The word "thankful" here is the present active imperative of eucharistos (ἐυχαρίστος), which is a command to keep on being thankful—something which you were not before. 2 Cor. 4:15 – "For all things are for your sakes, that the abundant grace might through the thanksgiving of many abound to the glory of God." Daniel said in Dan. 2:23 – "I thank Thee, and praise Thee, O thou God of my fathers, who has given me wisdom and might." Jesus, standing at the tomb of Lazarus just before he called Lazarus forth, prayed and said, "Father, I thank You that You have heard me." Paul said in Rom. 1:8 – "I thank my God through Jesus Christ." In Phil.1:3, "I thank my God." In I Cor.1:4 – "I thank my God always." In 2 Tim 1:3 – "I thank God whom I serve from my forefathers with a clean conscience, as unceasingly I have remembrance of you in my prayers night and day." Col. 2:7 – "…having been rooted and having been built up in Him and being confirmed in the faith as ye were taught, abounding in THANKSGIVING." (After being taught a person overflows with gratitude.)
