## Tongues In and Out of Context

### 1 Corinthians 14:21-22

<sup>21</sup> "In the law it is written, with men of other tongues and other lips will I speak unto this people; and yet for all that will they not hear me, saith the Lord. <sup>22</sup> Wherefore tongues are for a sign, not to them that believe, but to them that believe not: but prophesying serveth not for them that believe not, but for them which believe."

#### THE INTRODUCTION OF LANGUAGES:

- 1. From the fall of man until after the flood, we find that the whole world at this point spoke the same language. Genesis 11:1
- 2. The unified people wanted to build a tower to take their places in the heavens. Genesis 11:4
- 3. This was the impetus behind the creation of language, and the scattering of the people. Genesis 11:7
- 4. The creation of languages led to new nations, as speakers banded together.
- 5. This led to a new type of ministry; that of the missionary activity.

## WARNING THE JEWS OF JUDGMENT:

- 1. Moses lays out the cycle of obedience/prospering and rejection/punishment. Leviticus 26:14-46
- 2. The Jews were given many warnings of a nation whose language they do not understand. Deuteronomy 28:49; Jeremiah 5:15
- 3. Isaiah prophesizes that the Word of God will be presented to the Jews through foreign tongues. Isaiah 28:11
- 4. With his warning, Isaiah offers hope. Isaiah 28:12

## PENTECOST:

- 1. Pentecost is the third of the pilgrimage feasts and occurs 50 days after Passover.
- 2. The apostles had been commanded to wait in Jerusalem for the Holy Spirit by Jesus before the ascension. Acts 1:4-5
- 3. The Holy Spirit descended, indwelt and filled the apostles. Acts 2:2-3

# Tongues In and Out of Context (Continued)

#### TROUBLED TIMES IN CORINTH:

- 1. Citizens of Corinth were primarily followers of the Greek Pantheon, and temples to various Greek gods could be found throughout the city as well as other pagan deities.
- 2. The cities position with ports in two harbors led to being a melting pot for emotionally charged satanic religious cults.
- 3. This was how Paul found the city in 49 AD.
- 4. These temples of various types of worship included false tongues spoken either through a ventriloquist demon or emotional exaltation. These were not human languages.
- 5. Through the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit, Paul establishes a church of believers. He stayed in the city preaching and teaching for 18 months during his 2<sup>nd</sup> journey.

### PAUL'S LETTER TO CORINTH:

- 1. The church in Corinth had not grown spiritually since Paul left them. I Corinthians 3:1
- 2. The Corinthians had turned spirituality into a competition. 1 Corinthians 1:11-12
- 3. Despite the flaws of the church, they were given spiritual gifts. 1 Corinthians 1:7
- 4. The gift of tongues became coveted; those gifted with it used it to display their "greater" connection with God.
- 5. The gift of tongues was elevated over other spiritual gifts in the eyes of the Corinth believers. I Corinthians 12:15-16
- 6. Paul explains that in the Body of Christ, each believer is part of the body that represents Christ and each has a role to play. 1 Corinthians 12:25-27
- 7. Paul provides the believers at Corinth a list of the order in which the gifts should be valued. 1 Corinthians 12:28
- 8. He explained that their desire should be for the greater gifts; the gifts that build up the Body of Christ. Instead of longing to look superior amongst the congregation, work on building sound doctrine and focusing on the divine viewpoint. 1 Corinthians 12:31
- 9. "....and yet show I unto you a more excellent way."
- 10. In the midst of the Love Chapter, Paul explains how the temporary spiritual gifts are not long for this world.
